National Air and Space Museum now 50% Open

Planning a trip to Washington, DC?

If so, you will find that the Air and Space Museum is now half-way completed with a massive renovation.



Eight new or reimagined exhibitions, the planetarium, the museum store and the in-house café are open.

One gallery in the now open west end is "We All Fly." Greeting exhibit visitors is an inverted Oracle Challenger III aircraft made famous by airshow pilot Sean D. Tucker. Designed to allow Tucker to roll and tumble like no other flyer, the aircraft has eight ailerons and curved wing tips which enhanced maneuverability.



Museum admission is free, but timed admission passes are required. Go to the museum's website to schedule your visit.

Here's an idea – ask a fellow air squadron member to travel with you and enjoy the visit together!

Inside the gallery, the "We All Fly" theme is reflected in many aspects of general aviation – from an up-to-date Cirrus to helicopters to business and sport flying.

The museum's east end is currently being prepared for exhibit installation with artifacts slated to begin moving into the new galleries later this year.

Replacement of the building's facia stones was completed in December 2023.
